

Woolvett—In Arkona, on Wednesday, April 10th, 1929, Mr. William Woolvett, aged 70 years.

William Woolvett passed away early Wednesday morning at his home in Arkona, after an illness extending over a period of two months. Up till that time he had hardly ever known what it was to be laid up. He was born in Brightlingsea, Essex, England, in the year 1859, but went to London when a young man, and was employed in that city for many years. In 1884 he was married to Sussana Wright, who survives him. He is also survived by their six children, viz.:—William, of Forest; Walter, of London; Albert, of Bosanquet; Mrs. A. Patrick, of Sarnia; Mrs. Heather Dunham, of Arkona, and Mrs. Ray Gibson, of Bosanquet. In 1914 Mr. Woolvett emigrated to Canada, coming directly to Arkona, where almost immediately he was engaged by the officers of the Rock Glen Power Co. to operate the generating station on the Aux Sauble River. A few months afterward his family followed, settling in the dwelling situated at the Rock Glen dam. He occupied this position until

the advent of Niagara power in December, 1926, when he received the appointment of lineman on the new system. He was still engaged at this work when he contracted the illness in February, which resulted in his death. The funeral was held last Friday afternoon, conducted by the Rev. E. J. Roulston, of the United Church, of which deceased was a member. A private service was held in the home, after which there was a public service in the United Church. Interment took place in the Arkona cemetery. The pallbearers were three sons and three sons-in-law, viz.:—William, Walter and Albert Woolvett, Arthur Patrick, Heather Dunham and Ray Gibson. Many floral tributes were sent from sympathetic friends and relatives, the pupils of the Public and Continuation schools, the local Hydro Electric Commission and the Ladies' Aid.
